\P A Requiem Mass is the Eucharistic Sacrifice offered with the special intention of some soul, or souls, who, having gone through the human experience of death, we think of as being in the second state of the Church called Paradise, or the Church Expectant, where they are undergoing their final preparation for entry into the bliss of heavenly perfection. The Collect and Scripture Lessons given here are those provided in the Prayer Book for Requiems offered at funerals. At other times different Collects and Lessons may be used.

O Jesus, the Resurrection and the Life, who, departing out of this world, didst leave thy Body and thy Blood to be our meat and drink; by this thy boundless love, I beseech thee, have mercy on the souls of all the faithful departed.

Lead them to the fountain of life, refresh them at thy heavenly table, and stablish them in thy eternal kingdom; through thy merits, O Lord God, who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, ever, one God, world without end. Amen.

COME, Holy Ghost, fill my heart with the fire of thy divine love, that with devout attention and reverence I may offer this most holy Sacrifice, according to the rites of holy Church. Drive far from me all earthly thoughts and fill me with thy Spirit, that I may pray aright, and that *this* soul(s) may obtain all the benefits of which *he* stand(s) in need and which *he* so ardently desire(s), through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O the Eternal Word, assist with thy pray-

ers all faithful people living and dead, that aided by thy intercessions they may share thy bliss in heaven; through the merits of thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

■ The bread and wine are brought to the Celebrant who offers them to God and places them on the altar; and, at Solemn Mass, the offering, the altar, and the Celebrant are censed. The Celebrant washes his hands and then makes the offering in the following prayer which, after asking that God will receive the gifts, expands into a series of intercessions, which operates to bring others around God's altar. The full prayer will be found on p. 68.

 \P The bell rings again, and, having knelt in adoration, the Priest lifts the Cup.

AND we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

Prayer for the Benefits of the Offering

AND we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness, mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

Prayer for Communicants

AND here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee, that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

Prayer for the Acceptance of the Offering

AND although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice; yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offences, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

 \P Here the bell is rung thrice as a signal for intending communicants to approach the altar. And the Priest says the following prayer of preparation for communion which, in some places, is said here in connection with the Ritual Preparation of Communicants printed on p. 70.

W E do not presume to come to this thy Table, O merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under thy Table. But thou art the same Lord, whose property is always to have mercy: Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of thy dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body, and our souls washed through his most precious blood, and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. R. Amen.

 \blacksquare The Celebrant receives the Holy Gifts and then proceeds to administer them to the People. First he says:

BEHOLD the Lamb of God; behold him that taketh away the sins of the world.

■ And the People say with him thrice:

LORD, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof, but speak the word only and my soul shall be healed.

(While the Priest is making his Communion, use

the following prayers. And if you are not making a Sacramental Communion, be sure to make the act of Spiritual Communion.

O Lord Jesus Christ, forasmuch as *this* soul(s) believed on thee, look upon *him* in thy mercy and reward *his* faith.

O Lord Jesus Christ, forasmuch as this soul(s) hoped in thee, disappoint him not of his hope, but impart to him thyself in whom he trusted.

O Lord Jesus Christ, forasmuch as *this* soul(s) loved thee, even if it were with an imperfect love, look upon *him* and impart to *him* thyself, who art perfect Love.

O Lord Jesus Christ, forasmuch as *this* soul(s) repented *him* of *his* sins, and looked for pardon through thy most Precious Blood, forgive *him* and cleanse *him* that *he* may be meet to enjoy thy presence.

O Almighty God, with whom do live the spirits of just men made perfect, after they are delivered from their earthly prisons; We humbly commend the soul(s) of *this* thy servant(s) into thy hands, as into the hands of a faithful Creator and most merciful Saviour; most humbly beseeching thee, that *he* may be precious in thy sight. Wash *him*, we pray thee, in the blood of that immaculate Lamb, that was slain to take away the sins of the world; that whatsoever defile-

ments *he* may have contracted in the midst of this miserable and naughty world, through the lusts of the flesh, or the wiles of Satan, being purged and done away, *he* may be presented pure and without spot before thee, through the merits of the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
